Cutting Retards Growth.

"The less crowded the plants the more able were they to manufacture materials for growth of stems, hence they became in creasingly taller." The experiment also revealed that sudan grass is one of the strongest competitors Besides of weeds, because of its rapid growth and great height. Its repeated cutting, however, retards this natural development.

After the plants had been clipped or pastured once, the new growth yielded more where they had been clipped high than where they had been clipped closely. Repeated cutting back of the shoot proved to the experimentor that the tillers were stimulated, and once formed, they were least injured by successive cut-tings and developed bushy plants.
