Lincoln Minister Interprets Lent at Vesper Service.

Third of a series of pre-Easter addresses will be given Tuesday afternoon, March 24, when Dr. Paul C. Calhoun, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Lincoln, speaks at the Y. W. vesper services to be held at 5 o'clock in Ellen Smith hall.

With an interpretation of Lent as a theme, Dr. Calhoun will continue the Lenten discussions which are being given at each vesper service preceding Easter. Thus far, a different version of some phase of Lent has been discussed at each meeting, held during the Lenten period.

Devotionals, in keeping with the topic of the services, will be in charge of a member of the Y. W. cabinet, and Jane Hopkins, pianist of the vesper choir, will offer a prelude to the meeting by playing several selections on the piano.

Additional special music will be presented at the service by the vesper choir, which is under the direction of Margaret Phillippe, Y. W. cabinet member.

"Anyone interested in gaining a new interpretation of the Lenten observance should plan on attending the vesper services during the Lenten period. We feel that we are especially fortunate to have Dr. Calhoun with us at the meeting on Tuesday, and we are sure that those who attend the meeting will receive much valuable information." ART SOCIETY ADDS 'WINDOW CLEANING' TO COLLECTION

Nebraska Art association officials selected Aaron Douglas' picture, "Window Cleaning," as the 1936 addition to its permanent collection which hangs in the corridors of Morrill hall of the University of Nebraska.

Douglas graduated from the school of fine arts of the university in 1922 and was the only colored student ever elected to membership in the University Art club. His painting is the first by a former Nebraskan to be purchased by the association since William Schwartz's "Tent of Illusions" was bought in 1927.

Other paintings in the permanent collection done by Nebraskans include those by Sara S. Hayden and Sarah W. Moore, both early teachers at the university. Douglas is a member of the executive committee of the American

HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS ASK REGENTS GRANTS

1,300 Nebraska Graduates Compete in Spring Examinations.

Close to 1,300 graduating seniors from Nebraska high schools have signified their intentions of competing this spring for regents scholarships offered by the University. This is an all time high, stated officials of the extension division, Dr. A. A. Reed, director. In all, 380 high schools of the state are represented.

Lincoln high still leads the list with 28 entries followed by Alliance with 14, Wayne 12, Harvard and South Sioux City 11 each and Kearney, Jackson high, Mitchell and Wyoming with 10 each.

Several schools are represented for the first time this year. A total of 5,339 English examinations, approximately 5,000 psychology tests and 3,206 algebra exams will be taken this spring by competing seniors.

These figures represent not only those who are contesting for the scholarships, but also those seniors who desire at this time to avail themselves of the opportunity of taking the examinations which are required of all freshmen students entering the university.

Dr. O. J. Ferguson, dean of the engineering college, spoke at the concluding graduate scholarship dinner meeting at the University club Tuesday evening on the subject "On Putting the Engineer in His Place."

"The Comparative Educational Philosophies of the Chief Nations of the World" was the general topic discussed by Dr. G. W. Rosenlof of teachers college and Supt. M. C. Laffer of the Lincoln public schools at the Interprofessional Institute meeting Saturday evening at the Lincoln.

HUSKER RIFLERS BOW TO DAKOTANS 879-867

Pickup, Gable Lead Winners With High Scores of 181 Points.

Nebraska's rifle team bowed to the University of South Dakota's five by twelve points in their shoulder to shoulder match staged yesterday afternoon on the campus rifle range.

The final scores of 879 to 867 were not high for the day as Nebraska's third team chalked up 880 points in their non-competition shoot. George Beyer, a member of the third team, had the high man score of 184 points.

The high scores made in competition were attained by L. Pickup and L. Gable, both from South Dakota, with 181 points. These counts were closely followed by two scores of 180 made by both Gavin Humphrey and George Eager of Nebraska.

Nebraska's team will meet the army regulars from Fort Crook near Omaha in another shoulder to shoulder match here next Saturday afternoon.

The play is set in the time of the Seven Year's war, of Frederick the Great, Prussia's benevolent ruler and Germany's great military genius and hero. Mingled with epoch making historical events and political intrigue, are the strains of the minut and of Frederick's own flute.

The film is enjoying a very successful run in America and has been highly acclaimed by the critics of this country, according to a report of Dr. Joseph Alexis, chairman of the Germanics department.
