Carrel to Produce 'Test Tube' Kitten According to Plans

By College News Service. BERKELEY, Calif., Apr. 16 .-Dr. Alexis Carrel, famous surgeon and research worker of the Rockefeller Foundation, this week dis-

closed that he is planning to pro-duce a "test tube" kitten. His announcement was made following his final lecture in a special series at the University of California.

The kitten, Dr. Carrel said, could be brought into being in the "artificial heart and lungs" developed by himself and Charles A. Lind-

bergh. Dr. Carrel described Lindbergh's work as the "greatest contribution in modern times" to science.

"It would be entirely possible although probably not desirable, to develop a baby in the apparatus,' Dr. Carrel said. "But the expense would be enormous, and what would it prove?

"We can and will develop a kitten, but even with a very small kitten, the expense will be tremendous."
