MAJOR PSYCHOLOGY MAGAZINES PUBLISH INSTRUCTORS WORK

University Department Gains Recognition in Nation's Leading Journals.

Gaining national recognition for its work in the various fields of psychology,, the university departfent with its staff is well represented this month in the major psychological journals of the nation with the publication of several articles by University of Nebraska professors.

J. P. Guilford of the psychology department has written an article on the "Unitary Traits of Personality and Factor Theory," which is appearing in the American Journal of Psychology. Professor Guilford has conducted many ex-periments and devoted a great deal of study to this subject and the data so gathered are presente in

"Emphatic Responses of Children in Relation to Artistic Talent" is the subject of a discussion by M. E. Walton, also of the university department of psychology. The results of Walton's study of this topic are published in the Psychological Monograph, one of the outstanding publications this field.

Also in a current issue of the American Journal of Psychology, is an article written jointly by Elysbeth Allen and J. P. Guil-ford, entitled the "Factions Determining the Affective Value of Color Combinations,
