

# BIBLE SENDS THREE TEAMS THRU FINAL GRUEL BEFORE K. U.

### Mehring, Cardwell Rest During Active Scrimmage, But Will Play in Fourth Big Six Battle; Backfield Remains Unchanged.

A long and hard scrimmage for Coach D. N. Bible's three Cornhusker teams Wednesday concluded the more strenuous rehearsals of the week before the traditional Jayhawk game on Mt. Oread Saturday afternoon. Every Husker, excepting Lloyd Cardwell and Bob Mehring, took an active part in the scrimmage against Kansas formations.

Keeping the three squads hustling around the practice lots, Nebraska's coaching staff saw to it that every Husker received a chance to taste a sample of K. U. power, as demonstrated by two alternating varsity lineups.

Varsity eleven, playing a defensive game, kept a frosh team back in its tracks as Coach Bible's first-string line held very effectively. Lowell English was again filling Mehring's place at guard and Game Captain Ellis was holding down the tackle berth in place of Ted Doyle, Virg Yelkin, who turned in a great performance in last week's Missouri melee, received the nod over Elmer Dohrmann at right end. However, Dohrmann and Doyle alternated with Yelkin and Ellis at their defensive positions.

#### Yearlings Show Fire.

Charley Brock at center, Ken McGinnis at right guard, Fred Shirey at left tackle, and Les McDonald at left end completed the first-string line. # KANSANS TAKE HEART FROM ARIZONA GAME; DRILL ON AIR ATTACK

### Lindsey Concentrates on Receiving End to Stop Numerous Muffs.

Still heartened by their showing against the highly advertised Arizona gridders, who were held to a scoreless tie here Saturday, Coach Ad Lindsey's Kansans are drilling industriously on fundamentals, so that they'll have plenty to show the Cornhuskers this weekend.

Tackling last week showed decided improvement, and the Arizona ramblers who were supposed to make 8 to 15 yards at a clip found themselves bogged down by a determined K. U. defense. Blocking was a bit ragged, and only occasionally were real holes opened for the Jay running attack. Yet George Hapgood, veteran left half, made several long runs, eluding tacklers when it seemed he was hemmed in.

Numerous passes were used against Arizona, but only three clicked for substantial gains and many others could have gone for more yardage if the receivers hadn't muffed the flips. Pass-receiving, therefore, will take up much of the Jayhawk practice time this week.

**Combination Clicks.**  
Coach Ad Lindsey expressed satisfaction in the results of his latest shake-up in positions and believes he now has the combinations that will accomplish things.

"No more changes in positions are in sight," Lindsey said, "we're going to drill on the fundamentals and get real action."

"Nebraska has played three conference opponents this season, and not a one of them has scored on the Cornhuskers. It's about time somebody did, and we are going to do our damndest to break that shut-out streak. We scored on them at Lincoln last year before they caught their breath."

It will be recalled that Douglas kicked off last year and Cardwell allowed the kickoff to go over the goal line, believing at first that the kick was going out of bounds. The ball was downed by Hays in the end zone giving the Jayhawks their first score.

Hays contributed another touchdown in the third period. The pass combination of Repluge to Hapgood worked two times in the Arizona contest. Divens to Richardson was also good for 7 yards, but three pass completions out of 26 attempted forward passes is far from any coach's ideal of a passing football team.
