Sig Nu's Take Runnerup Post With Delta Upsilon, Beta Third, Fourth.

Phi Gamma Delta, leading their nearest competitor by 44 markers, swept through the finals of the Intramural rifle shoot last night and emerged as victors of the four day meet held at the military rifle range in the basement of Andrews hall.
