SENNING TO ADDRESS ALBUQUERQUE GROUP Setting Up Nebraska's One-House Legislature Is Instructor's Topic.

Dr. John P. Senning, chairman of the department of political science, was honored by officials of New Mexico when he was invited to speak Friday before the

Chambers of Commerce of that state at Albuquerque. Dr. Senning, an authority on government problems and a keen observationist of Nebraska's fight to secure the one-house legislature, discussed this state's recent experience in setting up the unicameral legislative body.

He will appear in the spring on the Omaha townhall forum program, at that time reviewing the progress or difficulties experienced as the result of the change in the Nebraska law making machinery.
