clusive Bellevue-Biltmore hotel in Belleair, Fla., heard his orchestra and brought him to the noted resort city for the winter season. So successful was the young band leader, that he later returned to the hotel for two additional seasons.

Meanwhile New York bookers had heard about his rising orchestra, and with the opening of the New Yorker hotel, Cummins was selected from among the 57 bands who auditioned for the opportunity of presenting the music for the formal opening.

### Recognized Nationally.

Since that time the maestro and his orchestra have repeated their engagements at the New Yorker twice and have entertained at such nationally famous hotels as the Edgewater Beach in Chicago, the Rice in Houston, and the Lowry and St. Paul in St. Paul.

Cummins' orchestra is coming to Lincoln directly from the Mark Hopkins hotel in San Francisco where he has just completed a six weeks engagement. The band will not play in the vicinity of Lincoln on any other night than the Inter-Fraternity Ball.
