# ARCHITECT STUDENTS STUDY KANSAS CITY ON INSPECTION TRIP

### Outstanding Structures During 3-Day Tour.

Eight upperclass students in the department of architecture. companied by A. L. Pugsley, in the department made their annual inspection trip recently, investigating the outstanding structures in Kansas

City, Mo. During the three-day trip, high-lights seen by the students in-cluded the Sheffield Steel works. the J. C. Nichols real estate company's new Country Club district, which included an \$85,000 home. and the Kansas City Electric Light and Power company tower. At the Jennens Plaster works they were shown how perfect replicas of marble pillars, in plaster, were made for the Kansas City War Memorial.

#### K. C. Light Building.

One of the most interesting displays was in the K. C. Light building, where examples of every old and modern lighting device was on exhibit. The resplendent William Rockhill Nelson Art Gallery was another high point in the trip. Beautiful pieces of Japanese and Chinese art, along with East Indian carvings, were particularly noted in the expansive

and perfectly modeled structure.
