Werkmeister Describes the Nazi Set-Up

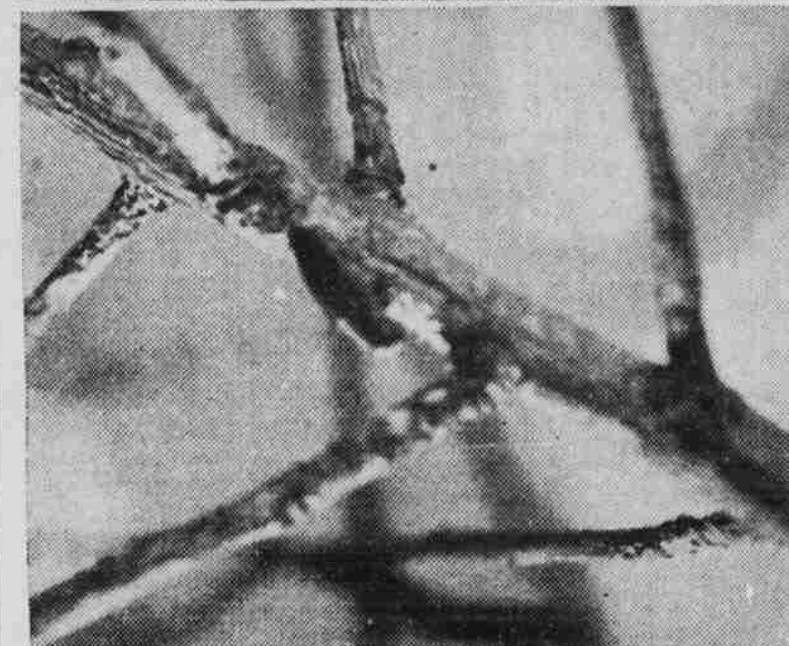
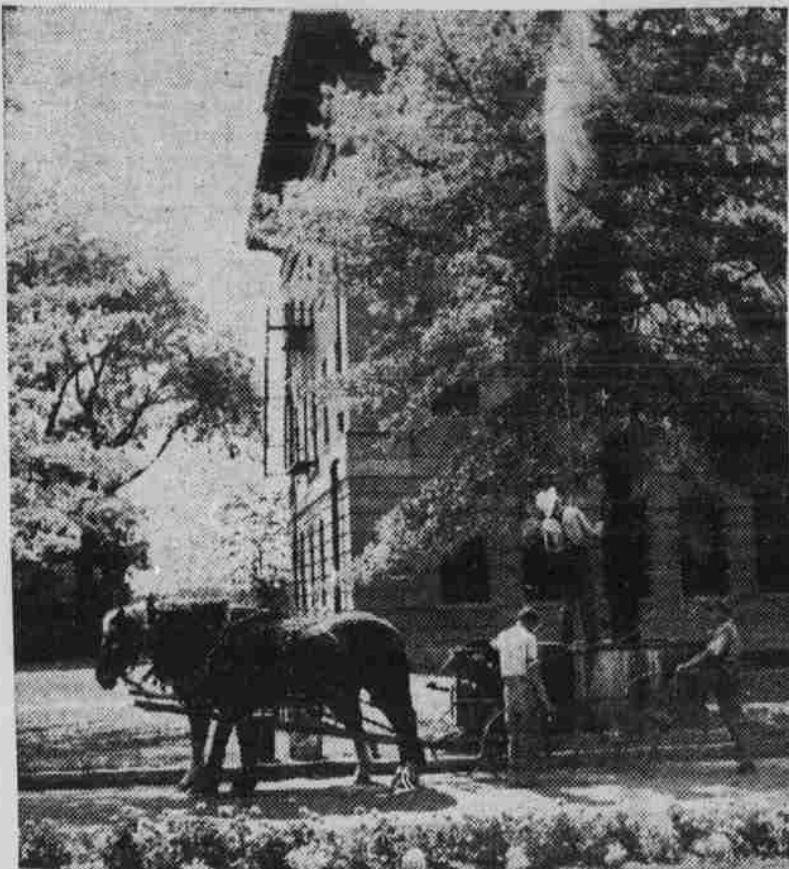

that if the working classes are provided with entertainment throughout the year they will not only be happy but more willing to work. Thus, as a part of the government program to aid the laboring classes, every German worker now receives vacation on pay, including a minimum of eight days and a maximum of three weeks, depending upon the individual's length of service and his age.

"So that the worker may really enjoy his vacation, the government has built special sea resorts for members of the 'Krafdurch Freude' where they may go at nominal costs, in addition to constructing specially built steamships which are now used by members for taking extended vacations to all parts of the world and at reduced rates," says Dr. Werkmeister.

PEST ATTACKS NEBRASKA TREES



As though the drouth had not already done sufficient damage, Nebraska now has a new pest, which authorities at the Agricultural Campus are attempting to control or check. It is the flat headed apple tree borer beetle, which is rapidly taking the foliage off elms, pin oaks, pear and other trees.

Many trees in eastern Nebraska, especially in and around Lincoln have been seriously damaged by this insect, and Ag College experts have used various solutions in sprays to determine the best mixture to recommend to those interested in saving the trees of the state.

typical case of his acquaintance, where one young coal miner, a member of the organization, took a three weeks' vacation, which included a railroad trip through Germany, a boat trip to Bergen, Norway, and back to his home again for a total cost of \$8.00. As another example of the government's interest in the common people, he told of the German workman who paid 22 cents for his seat at one of the fine German operas in Berlin while he (Dr. Werkmeister) paid approximately \$5.00 for an adjoining seat.

While he is enthusiastic over this part of the Nazi program for the working class, the university educator cannot endorse some of the other aspects of the Hitler platform. As far as the Jewish situation is concerned, Dr. Werkmeister does not believe that the Jewish people are now being physically beaten and their show win-

From The Lincoln Journal. dows demolished, but, he says, in the rural areas pressure has been brought to bear on the German people to boycott Jewish stores. Since the Jews have been barred from all professions and government careers, their case is really hopeless, he says. In his opinion, the last decree stipulating that no German Jew may obtain a Ph. D. degree in any university is merely evidence that this part of the Nazi policy which specified that the Jews must be eliminated from the cultural life of Germany is being carried out to the letter.

Dr. Werkmeister also feels that the situation is such in Germany that the final showdown of the Church versus the State is fast approaching. Conditions, he said, which led to this deplorable state of affairs is too complex and difficult to trace in all cases.

While in Germany, Dr. Werkmeister gave many lectures before university groups going thru the country and before various civic and professional meetings. He had an opportunity of knowing and studying with the many German philosophers of note and also attended the second international congress for the unity of science which was held at Copenhagen, Denmark. Aside from his school

VOLUNTEER STUDENTS TO TAKE DRIVING TESTS

Motor Vehicle Association Will Sponsor Tests of Physical Fitness.

In an attempt to impress the nation with the idea that there are certain necessary physical factors which make for good automobile drivers and those of an opposite nature which produce dangerous drivers, the American association of motor vehicle administrators and the automobile industry are sponsoring a series of safety conferences in important universities over the country. These tests are under the sponsorship and direction of the Harvard university bureau for street traffic research. Dr. Herbert J. Stack, director of the education division of the National Bureau of Conservation, will be at the University all day July 22 to conduct driving tests for a large group of volunteer students.

According to Dr. D. A. Worcester, chairman of the department of educational psychology and measurements, who is in charge of the test here, Dr. Stack is bringing with him testing machines which will test the following:

1. Brake reaction time.
2. Steering.
3. Vigilance.
4. Glare-vision.
5. Depth perception.
6. Color vision.
7. Peripheral vision.

Students desiring to take the tests will make arrangements with Dr. Worcester at his office, Teachers college 309 C. This safety conference is another feature of the university's summer session.
