

INDOOR TRACK TITLE AT STAKE

NEBRASKANS FACE LOOP CINDERMEN TODAY, SATURDAY

Mizzou, Kansas State Set for Effort to Grab Husker Crown.

The Husker track team opens the defense of its indoor championship this afternoon when the qualifying trials for the quarter and half mile are run off in the Big Six meet at Columbia, Mo. Last year the Huskers set a new scoring record to annex the indoor championship.

Nebraska will have a harder time this year than they did last. Strong competition is expected from both Missouri and Kansas State. Nebraska and Missouri have both defeated the Aggies by a narrow margin. Iowa State, Kansas and Oklahoma are not even conceded an outside chance of winning, and are expected to fight it out among themselves for the last three positions.

Honor Schulte.

The Husker 440 and 880 men left for Columbia yesterday. The remainder of the squad pulled out early this morning. Qualifying trials for all events other than the 440 and 880 will be held tomorrow afternoon, with the finals being run off tomorrow night.

Henry Schulte, present track coach of Nebraska and former track and football coach at Missouri from 1913 to 1919, will be honored by the athletes who competed under him at Missouri, in a special ceremony before the finals. Among those honoring him, will be several men whom Schulte has not seen since he left Missouri and came to Nebraska in 1919.

Herb Gish, former director of athletics at Nebraska, will be the official starter in this year's meet.

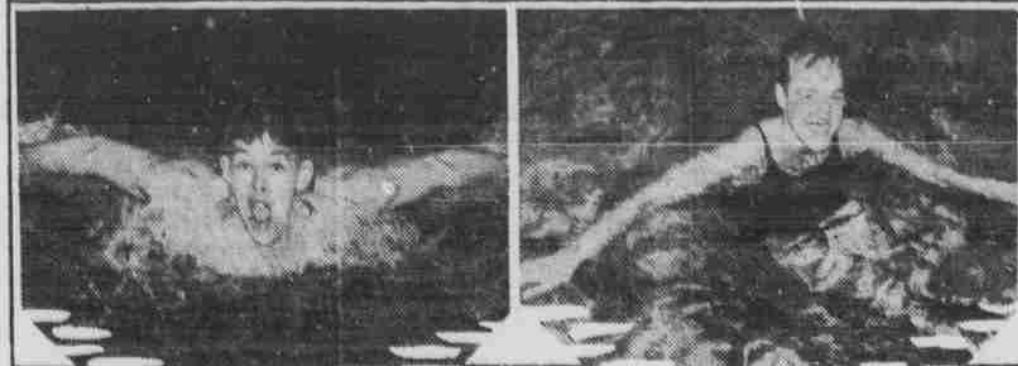

HUSKER MATMEN POINT FOR TITLE IN BIG SIX MEET

Jim Knight Leads Nebraska Against Three Strong Conference Foes.

Coach Jerry Adams and his Husker mat team left early this morning for Ames, Ia., where they will attempt to dethrone the conference champion Iowa State Cyclones in the Big Six wrestling meet which is being held today and tomorrow. Other schools entered in the meet are Kansas State and Oklahoma.

Iowa State is doped to carry off the lion's share of the honors, with the Aggies and Sooners being their only real competition. Those who know say that Nebraska will do no better than a poor fourth.

Knight Unbeaten.

The Husker's strongest entrant will be Jim Knight, 135, who is unbeaten in conference competition. Knight has defeated Kirstein, of Iowa State, who was conference runnerup last year. He also defeated Warner of Kansas State who was co-champion in 1934. The Husker's main strength is the lower weight divisions. Fred Webster, Charley Miegel, Jim Knight, and Bill Luke, wrestling from 118 to 145, are Nebraska's best scoring bets. Luke is the second high scorer on the team this year.

Need for Hurlers Urgent as Ball Team Shows Early Promise.

The 1938 edition of the Cornhusker baseball squad is gradually taking shape as they work out in the confines of the coliseum. Some of the players were on the basketball team, and were not able to report until this week, but at present the squad is almost at full strength. Practice has been confined to indoors, but they have plenty of time to round into condition as the opening game is more than a month away.

The fate of the team rests largely upon the way the pitchers develop, and the ability of youngsters to fill some of the key positions. The shortstop post, along with two outfield positions are wide open, and if the men who win these positions come thru, the Huskers should give a good account of themselves.

The season will be inaugurated by a road trip to Waco, Tex., where they will meet the powerful Baylor team in a two game series, on April 4th and 5th. On the way back they will meet Oklahoma U. at Norman in a two game stand on the 7th and 8th, and then finish the trip with a single game against Oklahoma A. & M. on the 9th.

The complete schedule, which will include 20 games, has not as yet been completed. One of the highlights of the season will be a clash with California's Golden Bears, at Lincoln, on May 17.

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CHILL WIND LIVENS PRACTICE SESSIONS IN PIGSKIN CLASSES

Biffer Stresses Pass Attack as Foundation for Next Year's Strategy.

Fundamentals still occupied the spotlight yesterday as Maj. "Biff" Jones sent his football charges thru a light passing, punting, running and blocking drill on the varsity practice field.

Brisk weather, reminiscent of November, livened the practice as a few spectators braved the chill winds to watch the Huskers run thru their exercises. The Major may have to depend on quick passes next season to bring him victory, and it was this phase of the game that received a good deal of attention at the beginning of the practice session.

The backfield combinations were split into two groups, and the fullbacks received special instruction in line plunging while the halfbacks were drilled in cutbacks and off-tackle plays.

Link Lyman took his linemen thru blocking and charging exercises while Browne gave the squad practice on the tackling dummies.

The first string line remained in tact with Grimm and Kahler at ends, Schwartzkopf and Thompson at tackles, Pfeiff and Dobson at guards and Brock at center. Bob Mills the first string tackle is with the indoor track team at Columbia and did not report for practice yesterday.

In the backfield combination were Phelps, Callihan, Hoffman and Rohrig. Dodd and Plock were absent, too, because of the Big Six track meet.

Phelps was in his old form heaving out the pigskin into the waiting arms of Rohrig, Hoffman or Anderson with such deadly accuracy that the receiver had little trouble in plucking the pill out of the ozone and heading toward pay dirt.

Hugo Hoffman and Bill Anderson turned in good performances at plugging the mythical line displaying superb form and speed. Vike Francis, brother of All-American Sam, also looked good at the full position and undoubtedly will crowd the veterans before the fall season rolls around.

Swivel-hipped Harry Hopp, frosh from Hastings, showed versatile ball handling and clever running. Center candidates had a busy afternoon as the Major used them most of the day to snap back the oval for the backfield drills. Bob Burress was snapping the ball with accuracy, and with Bob Ramey, should provide ample service for Iron Man Brock's pivot position.
