

Her tour of the continent was immensely successful. One critic writes: "The storm of praise swept Europe, Conductor Arturo Tos canini gave her his sensitive car, told her, 'A voice like yours comes once in a century'." After the Salzbury Festival in 1935, critic Herbert F. Feyser of the New York Times hailed her as "one of the greatest living singers."


