

Jack Fischer, editor of the Daily Nebraskan, announced in Novemper of 1935, that "petitions circulated among the students signifying willingness to pay a small ing the building had been signed by nearly 3,000 students. The Alumni association has agreed to finance the equipment that would be needed for the structure. Support of all Nebraska representatives and senators save one has been secured at Washington, and PWA officials heartily endorsed the plan." At that time the approval of the board of regents was all that was needed to permit an appeal for federal funds.

Regents Approve.

The next chapter, or epoch, in the history of the student union, was the approval by the regents of the petition for securing PWA funds. This occurred Friday, Feb. 14, 1936. The greater part of the struggle was over. The big day was Oct. 23, 1936.
