University Athletic Office Puts Blocks On Student Ticket Abuses

Due to a more strict supervision of athletic tickets, only duly registered students will occupy the student section in the east stadium this fall. No outsiders will be allowed in the location allotted students and faculty members. This action has been taken by the university athletic department to prevent persons not connected with the university from using undergraduate privileges, an abuse which non-students practiced extensively last fall.

tion for students and we ask the co-operation of the student body to see that outsiders are kept out," stated John Selleck, business manager of athletics.

Students Only

To insure exclusion of outsiders, these barriers will be raised: Organized groups will be entitled to purchase only as many tickets as they have names listed in the undergraduate body.

Faculty members as listed in the official university catalog, will be allowed to purchase activity tickets only for themselves and members of their immediate, dependent family.

Special entrances will be used by the students when attending home football games.

Inspection stations at the entrances will assist in preventing outsiders from using student books.

Identification cards are to be presented at the entrance along with the activity book.

Each group wishing to reserve seats in the student section will send one representative with student identification cards and the money for the entire group to the student activities office in the collection on Sept. 17 or 25. The office will be open to receive deposits for tickets from 8:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m., Tuesday, Sept. 27 and from 8:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m., Wednesday, Sept. 28. The drawing for seat assignments for the various groups and individuals will be made at 1:00 p. m. Sept. 28 by the editor of the Daily Nebraskan. Seats will be allotted in the student section in the east stadium. The bloc of 5,500 tickets includes the nine center sections, from the south ten yard line to the north ten yard line and extends from the first to the 30th row. Rows 30 to 47 comprise the faculty bloc.

Dr. Bell Reports New Archeological Finds

The university archeological expedition in the northeastern part of the state has recently made the important discovery of a new type of ancient Nebraskan, reports Dr. Earl H. Bell, assistant professor of anthropology, who has just returned from an observation tour of "three major excavation sites. Characterized by his long narrow skull and a style of pottery and arrow heads hitherto unknown, this "old settler" from Nebraska plains an established thousand years ago.

Work Continues. The 1938 expedition, most successful of the five which have been sent into the field, will enable university scientists to add several new chapters to the early history of Nebraska and of the continent. Work at the principal sites near Stanton, O'Neill and Ponca, will continue for at least two more weeks. During the winter, the material discovered in the field will be assembled and prepared for publication.

been located 10 to 12 feet beneath today's town of Pilger; a site of recent origin showing the influence of early white men on the Indian has been found; several huge mounds 60 feet long, 35 feet wide and 6 feet high are now being excavated to discover whether or not they are actually Indian burial mounds. A matter of historical importance is connected with the last discovery for until now, such large burial mounds have been found only in the east. Also, this year is the first time university workers have used aerial photography to locate archeological sites.
