Smith Views Architecture

Language Students Attend Slide Lecture

Prof. Linus Burr Smith, dean of the college of architecture, will discuss "The Religious Architecture of France" tomorrow at 4 o'clock in Social Science auditorium, continuing a series of lectures conducted by the department of romance languages.

With emphasis upon the most beautiful and representative French cathedrals, Prof. Smith will illustrate his talk with slides, showing the development of different types of architecture in various parts of France.

Prof. Smith will continue with his discussion of French architecture on Thursday, December 1, at the same place and hour. The combined lectures will constitute two of three being held for the purpose of familiarizing French students with the countries of the language they are studying, and incidentally to give them an opportunity for extra credit in their classes. The third French lecture will be presented on Thursday, January 12.

Similar supplementary lectures for Spanish students have already begun, with Ray Ramsay speaking on October 20. Prof. Nels Bengtson will talk on "Central America" on Thursday, November 17, and a third lecture, on a subject not yet determined, will be held on Thursday, January 5.
