One hundred and sixty-two years ago tomorrow, on Dec. 5, 1776, five men sat down together around a table in the Apollo room of Raleigh Tavern at Williamsburg, Va., and founded the first Greek letter organization in America. Those men were students of the College of William and Mary, and the organization they founded was Phi Beta Kappa, national scholarship society.
