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Filings Open For Prom Committee

Council Will Select 12 Members of Group At Meeting on Dec. 14

Filings for the twelve places on the Junior-Senior Prom committee will open Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock in the student activities office in the coliseum and close Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock, according to dates set by the Student Council.

Of the twelve members of the committee, there can be not more than three women and two men from outside the Council. The junior class president, Grant Thomas, automatically becomes a member of the committee. All candidates must file in the activities office before the Friday deadline, whether from the student body or the Council.

Must Be Juniors.

Final selection of the committee will be made from the filing list by the student governing body at their next meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 14. Rules of eligibility which must be met by all candidates specify that committee members have no less than 52 and no more than 89 credit hours, (that is, junior standing). Candidates must also meet the general University requirements which call for their having successfully carried 27 hours during the two previous semesters and also be carrying 12 hours in good standing at the time of filing.

As one of the University's foremost social functions and the traditional closing party for the formal season, the planning and management of the prom is generally considered to be of valuable experience to students aspiring to activities honors. Committee election is held early in order to allow members ample time to make satisfactory arrangements for the affair, including the signing of a nationally known dance orchestra and working out a suitable presentation idea for the Prom Girl.

Nominations may be either barbs or members of sororities. It is important that duplicate nominations be avoided as much as possible. Annuals may be purchased until February 15.

It was a restless crowd, anxious for things to happen; it was an appreciative audience as a battery of field artillerymen and the Pershing Rifles crack squad went thru their part of the program with clock like precision; it was an approving audience as it cheered the new honorary colonel.

Chosen at the fall election by student vote, the new colonel's identity was kept a secret until her presentation, Miss Fleetwood, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E. J. Fleetwood of Lincoln, is a senior in the arts and sciences college, a member of Kappa Alpha Theta, student council, Mortar board, Tascala, Y. W. C. A., Phi Delta Phi, and president of Coed Counselor board.
