N.U. Extends Christmas Vacation

Classes to Reconvene Tuesday Noon, Jan. 3, After Holiday Recess

University students will get an extra day and a half Christmas vacation this year following action of the university senate Monday afternoon in setting Tuesday noon, Jan. 3, for the resumption of classes after the Christmas recess. The university calendar had originally scheduled classes to begin at 8 a. m. Monday, Jan. 2. The Christmas vacation will start Saturday noon, Dec. 17.

The senate also approved the university calendar for 1939-40. Next year, Christmas vacation will run from noon on Wednesday, Dec. 20, until noon of Wednesday, Jan. 3, 1940. Acting in conformity with recent action by the board of regents, the new calendar schedules Nov. 11, Armistice day, as a holiday.

The calendar shows that the long session of the 1939 summer school will run from noon of June 6 until Aug. 4, and the short session will run from June 6 until July 14. Classes for the first semester of next year will start on Sept. 21 with the previous two weeks given over to tests, registration and other preliminaries. In general, classes will start a week later next year than they did this year.

Band to Practice Wednesdays, Fridays

Beginning Wednesday, Dec. 7, all band men not in the symphonic unit will meet on Wednesdays and Fridays at 5 o'clock for rehearsal in the band practice room. This procedure will be followed for the remainder of the semester.

Honored along with them will be Nebraska's ten senior grid-ders and ten seniors who have played their last football game for Nebraska Wesleyan.

Beginning the day, the guests will attend a general reception in the chamber of commerce rooms, followed by a luncheon. Presiding over the noon affair will be Max Roper, president of the junior chamber.

Songs by the university glee club, introduction of Nebraska and Nebraska Wesleyan coaching staffs, certificate awards to the college seniors being honored and introduction of Jeanne Newell, Nebraska Sweetheart, are scheduled for this luncheon.

All Sports Demonstration.

A trip to Nebraska Wesleyan's campus will follow the luncheon with a surprise program in store for the 300 guests. The latter part of the afternoon will be spent in the Husker coliseum, with swimming, wrestling, boxing, basketball and gymnastics exhibitions on tap. A track demonstration will be staged in the stadium.

Six o'clock will find guests and all others interested in the rally dining in the Student Union ballroom. An exhibition program of tumbling and special work on rings and horizontal bars by Nebraska's champion gymnasts will follow the dinner.

After the dinner and gymnastic exhibition, the rally will adjourn to the chamber of commerce rooms for a smoker, where billiards, ping pong, and bridge will occupy those present.

At 7:30, football movies will be shown, to be followed by three Kosmet Klub skits. A dutch lunch at 9:45 o'clock will conclude the rally.

Filings for eleven of the twelve positions on the Junior-Senior Prom committee open at 8 o'clock this morning in the student activities office in the coliseum. They will continue until Friday afternoon at 5.

Automatically a member of the committee by virtue of his being junior class president is Grant Thomas. Of the remaining eleven members-to-be, at least three women and two men must, according to constitutional provisions, be chosen from outside the Council.

All candidates, whether they belong to the Council or not, must file before the Friday deadline. Final committee selection will be made from the filing list by the student governing body at its next meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 14.

General university eligibility requirements must be met. Candidates must have successfully carried 27 hours of work during the two preceding semesters, and must carry 12 hours in good standing at the time of filing. In addition to the regular requirement, all members of the committee must be of junior standing—that is, have no less than 62 and no more than 83 credit hours.

Physician to Relate Experiences in India

As guest of honor at a Nu-Med dinner to be held tomorrow night at 6:15 in the Union parlors X and Y, Dr. J. J. Hompes, Lincoln physician will speak on his experiences in India.

Dr. Hompes during his two months' tour of the far East devoted his time to studying the economic and social conditions of the outlying regions of India. Commenting on the conditions existing throughout the entire country, Dr. Hompes said, "Ethics of medicine and methods of administering it are very crude as a whole, however, in the more civilized regions conditions are usually good."

The noted physician's lecture will be illustrated by films taken during his stay in India. Of particular interest to pre-med students will be films of operations that he made there. Following the program, annual election of officers will be held, according to Russell Cashen, president.
