then shown one by one, and each time the doctor asked if he held the card I had chosen. I answered "no" for every card including the one chosen. The answer for the card bearing "let" was given in the same tone and manner in which the others were given. After repeating the test several times, Ruckmick showed me the record card he had kept. It clearly indicated that when I answered "no" for the "let" card, I had lied. The needle had hardly fluctuated for the other answers even though I had been slightly nervous during parts of the demonstration.

Detector 90% Accurate.

"In the hands of a competent operator, the lie detector is better than 90% accurate. It indicates changes in emotional state of the subject by means of inevitable and instantaneous changes in the electrical potentials of the sweat glands in the palm of the hand," explained the psychologist. "Girls are better subjects than men."

The Affectometer has been demonstrated to J. Edgar Hoover of the F. B. I. and to leading police forces throughout the country by Dr. Ruckmick. One of its greatest values is in gaining confessions from criminals after it has caught them lying. As yet, lie detectors are not accepted as direct evidence in court. However, they are rapidly becoming popular in the eyes of the police and psychologists.

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
