

Huskers take another tough workout as Jones uses west stadium lights second time

Biff Jones drilled his charges rigorously again last night as for the second time in a row the third stringers finished up practice under the lights after the first and second teams had called it quits. Jones drilled his first team on defense against Kansas plays as exhibited by the freshmen throughout a large part of the evening, while the seconds were polishing their offense against another frosh lineup. He then put the first stringers on offense, as the seconds finished on defense, and the third team took over from there as they drilled on offense.

Butch Luther was back at his old right halfback position after being on the sidelines in a sweat suit last night, while Fred Preston returned to active duty at second string end, he also having been on the inactive list last night.

Bob Kahler stars. Bob Kahler, moved up to the second team this week in place of Bob DeFruiter, was back with the seconds after filling in for Luther last night. The big Grand Islander turned in several sparkling runs against the frosh defenders, while Hermie Rohrig, with the second team this week, also turned in a fine defensive performance. George Abel looked

good on pass defense, intercepting a frosh pass when the seconds were on defense. Harry Hopp and Mike Francis were doing most of the offensive work for the first team.

The Huskers are in better shape physically than they have been all with the return of Luther and Preston to active duty, after slight injuries against Missouri, and with Jerome Prochaska, third string end, back after missing the last two games because of a knee injury. Howard Kelly, reserve

soph center, who has not played this year, is on the sidelines because of injuries picked up in practice though. The first string, as it ran last night, and the team which will probably open against Kansas had Seemann and Ashburn at ends; R. Kahler and S. Schwartzkopf at tackles; E. Schwartzkopf and Alfson at guards; Burruss at center. Bus Knight, Harry Hopp, Butch Luther and Mike Francis are in the backfield. Preston and R. Prochaska, ends; Herndon and Behm, tackles; Monsky and Abel, guards; Ramey, center; and Petsch, Rohrig, B. Kahler and Dobson in the backfield make up the second string.

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Findley outruns Templeton in five-mile grudge marathon

Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, at which time our Huskers were unfavorably engaged in a football game, the race of the century was run off on the indoor track under the east stadium.

Duane Findley, freshman footballer and the best high school miler in the state last year, beat Warren Templeton, music major and several other things, in a five-mile grudge race in which Findley was clocked by all six timers in 38 minutes and 25 seconds as he finished about 200 feet ahead of musician Templeton, who is still bemoaning his own lack of condition. Findley passed Templeton, who had led most of the way, on the last few laps of the 35-lap race.

It all started when Templeton, who is majoring in music, and who

says he is minoring in voice, English, history and athletics, said he was a better man than Findley. Templeton works over 100 hours per month, and carries 16 hours of school work, and has made an 86 average in his first three years in school. Anyway, in his spare time he is reported to swim, play football (with whom we don't know), go out for track, baseball, Rifle club, pistol shooting, riding, roping and dancing with a capital "D."

However, he was still nearly out on his feet Monday from the big race, on which \$50 was bet. Templeton lost \$10 to Findley, but the two will race again in three weeks after extensive training, so they say, and if Templeton wins he gets his \$10 back again.
