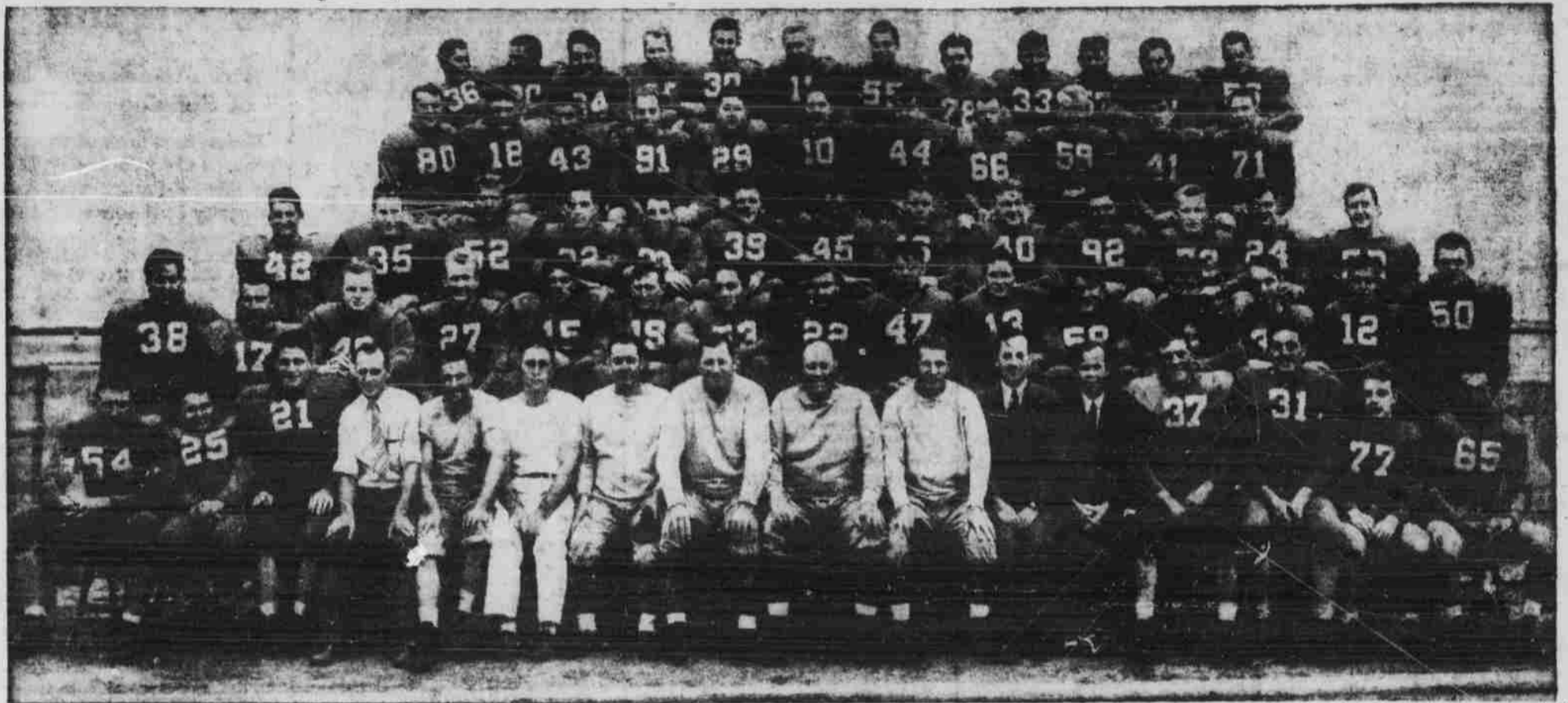

## Wallace puts Nebraska in top 15 teams

According to Francis Wallace, noted sports authority, Nebraska is among the 15 best football teams in the nation on the basis of severity of competition. This fact is so stated in the current issue of The Saturday Evening Post.

In his annual article, Wallace previews the grid season, naming winners, outstanding stars and discussing prospects of college teams from coast to coast.

His 15 top teams for 1940 are: Notre Dame, Texas A. & M., Washington, Nebraska, Fordham, Ohio State, Cornell, Tennessee, Tulane, Duke, Southern Methodist, Santa Clara, Minnesota, Northwestern and Southern California.

Wallace's first team in the All-American selection is: ends, Ison, Georgia Tech and Goodreault, Boston College; tackles, Drabos, Cornell and Enich, Iowa; guards, Sufbridge, Tennessee and Sohn, Southern California; center, Mucha, Washington; backs, Scott, Ohio State, Harmon, Michigan, Piepul, Notre Dame, and Kimbrough, Texas A. & M.

Warren Alfson, Nebraska guard, and Herman Rohrig, Husker back, were among the stars placed on the second team by Wallace.

Mucha of Washington, Wallace believes, will be the best lineman of the year and the best back will be Don Scott of Ohio State. As the sophomore back, Wallace selects Jim Jurkovich of Southern California.

Last year, Wallace picked George Cafago of Tennessee as his back of the year. Cafago was chosen No. 1 by the pro footballers in their annual draft selections. His lineman of the year, Harry Smith of Southern California, was the only unanimous selection on eight leading All-American teams.
