Psychologist to study classification tests

Coming from Randolph Macon Women's College Dr. Charles M. Harsh, professor of psychology, is assisting in instructional research and is analysing the classification tests of the students in the Junior

Dr. Harsh majored in physical chemistry and was graduated as the head of his class from the California Institute of Technology. 1931 he was awarded six months of travel in Europe by that college.

He received his master's degree from the University of California in 1935, and his Ph.D. a year later. From 1936 to 1939 he was an instructor and head tutor at Harvard and Radcliffe Colleges.
