Two days before the football team departed for its game with Minnesota, members of the Daily Nebraskan business staff solicited fraternity and sorority houses to give the team a sendoff to let them know that they were behind the team. Each house was charged \$2 to have its name appear on the page. The total income from one page netted the Daily approximately \$70, plus the other advertising placed on that page.
Since when is it necessary for us to BUY school spirit? Many students turned out for one of the largest rallies in the University's history to give the team a sendoff. It is that kind of school spirit that we want at Nebraska.
The Daily has always given adequate space to pep rallies, and for that the students and pep organizations are appreciative. But fraternities and sororities do not comprise over one-fourth of the University's total enrollment and are not, therefore, a truly representative part of the school.
Last Thursday presidents and treasurers of the various houses were again asked to pay \$2 each

for a page devoted to a welcome for alumni on Homecoming. How many alumni who might possibly read the Daily do not know that they are being welcomed? Not only fraternities and sororities, but other campus organizations extend invitations of welcome to alumni. The football game is also advertised as the Homecoming game and fraternities and sororities contribute to the interest of Homecoming with their participation in the Homecoming Decorations contest.
Nobody wants to see the Daily operate at a loss and it has not done so in the past. Judging from its ability to show a fat profit annually and the fact that the customary four-page paper contains well over one-third of advertising copy, it does not appear likely that it should be necessary for organized houses to buy school spirit or pay for a welcome to alumni on an event that is already an established tradition at the University of Nebraska.
