

Conquered European peoples defiant; near revolution—Russell Wright

"People in Poland, France, and other conquered European states in their hearts are very defiant about being subdued by the nazi regime and will revolt at the first opportunity," Russell Wright, roving news photographer, observed yesterday as he discussed life and conditions in war-torn Europe.

"There will be starvation in Europe this winter," he declared, "but the Germans will eat. I believe the food shortage will occur in Norway, Denmark, the Balkans, and Poland. At the present France has a good store, but how long it will last or how far it will go depends on how much the Germans take. Not only is there a probability of starving masses of Frenchmen, but they also have a very serious unemployment problem to solve. Since the Lorraine region has been declared German, the French have been forced to move into Poland or unoccupied France for their livelihood."

Wright began tour last year.

Wright returned from Europe and the fascinating experiences of a news reel photographer almost a year ago, and has since spent his time lecturing in the United States showing his documentary movies of conditions resulting from World war II. A very young looking man, even though his hair is graying at the temples, Wright has been in the journalism game for ten years. His specialty is the field of journalism photography,

although he is equally efficient as a news writer, having done both jobs in Spain during the civil war.

Wright has inevitably arrived in cities destined to make history in advance of the crises to occur, and in time to get stories first when they break. He explains his foresight very logically. "I only endeavor to analyze the situation," he said, "because by a careful analysis, one can usually forecast events and the time and place for their occurrence."

As interesting experiences as could happen to any foreign correspondent have probably happened to Wright. In Danzig, he was "taken for a ride by two black shirts" and imprisoned for 24 hours for taking pictures of military activity. He has run into similar trouble in Austria and Germany and in every city, "it is like sneaking into a fort past scores of guards to get to the place where I can take any meaningful shots," he affirmed.

"As a rule, the news reels shown in American theaters are highly censored," he said, "but the extent of the censoring depends on the subject material and the cameraman." According to Wright, it is essential for a camera man to excite no suspicion about his work and to make contacts with the right people.

Although he has not been in England since Hitler began his bombardment of that country,

Wright prophesied that the morale of the British will not be weakened. He thinks they "can take it." "The Greeks," this analytical reporter said, "depend a great deal on the British who are doing all aviation work of any significance for them. They do not have much equipment and their position for victory is questionable, but they are putting up a good fight."
