"one of our most pressing needs." To erect the building, an estimated \$175,000 would be needed. The regents suggest that, with the approval of the legislature, \$75,000 of the total cost might be supplied from the hog cholera serum account.

New quarters must be found for the highway testing laboratory and for some department of the engineering college. For this purpose, the purchase of the Bancroft school from the Lincoln school board is contemplated. Concerning the regents say, "the highway testing laboratory fund, operated by the engineering college, has a balance large enough to be significant in the purchase and remodeling of the Bancroft school building. An appropriation of \$25,000 would be sufficient to make possible this needed addition to the university plant."
