Howard Engleman breaks loop scoring record—has game left

LAWRENCE, Kan.—The new Big Six scoring champion, Howard Engleman of Kansas, goes after more points Friday night against Oklahoma in an effort to put the conference record in safe keeping for a while.

Four points past the old record already, Engleman can set a mark hard to beat if he enjoys his usual good fortune against Oklahoma. Two years ago as a sophomore, Howard scored 44 points in two games with the Sooners.

With 158 points in nine conference games, Engleman boasts an average of 17.6. The old Big Six scoring record of 154 points was set by Frank Groves of Kansas State in 1937.

Groves also established a record for field goals that season, racking up 64. Engleman has yet to overhaul that mark, needing three baskets in the final game to equal it.

Another record that the former Arkansas City high school ace has only one game left in which to better is the mark for most points in one contest. Jimmy McNatt of Oklahoma holds that, as the result of a 30 point spree against the Nebraska Cornhuskers last year.

Engleman's closest approach to this, was the 27 markers he chalked up against Oklahoma in 1939. This year his season's high was the 26 points he collected in the game with Missouri.
