In nation-wide observance . . . 'American Day' program features government branch representatives

In observance of nationwide "I-Am-An-American Day," which has been proclaimed by President Roosevelt in recognition of the country's young men and women who have just reached the voting age, CBS will broadcast a special program today under the auspices of the National Education Association.

The program, to be heard at 2 p. m., will include addresses by representatives of the executive,

legislative and judicial branches and the Citizen," while Dr. Joy Elmer Morgan, editor of the NEA journal, presides at the microphone. Schools throughout the country, including Lincoln, will hold ceremonies in connection with the observance.

Kansas radio amateur gets Paley award

Chosen by a board of five judges, Marshall H. Ensor, 41-year-old radio amateur of Olathe, Kas., will receive the William S. Paley amateur radio award of 1940, when he flies to New York June 2.

The Paley award is presented annually as a permanent honor "to that individual who, through amateur radio, in the opinion of an impartial board of awards, has contributed most usefully to the American people, either in research, technical development or operating achievement, and to be open to all amateur radio operators in the United States and Canada."

Ensor was chosen by the judges because of his service to the nation in voluntarily conducting courses in the fundamentals of radio over his own radio station, W9BSP, over a period of 10 years. During that time he has given code practice lessons on the air to thousands of young men on regular schedule, enabling them to pass their examinations for amateur radio licenses.
