Louis Fischer, author and foreign correspondent, ministers, commissars, and army generals and has will lecture on the subject, "Is This the End of Bolshevism," Monday, Oct. 28 at the opening convocation of the 1941-42 series in the Union ball-

Because he is in constant touch with leading officials and diplomats, Fischer promises to present an up-to-the-minute survey of news behind the news in war-torn Europe.

In 1921 Fischer was sent to Berlin by the New York Post and since then he has spent the last 19 years on roving assignments in Europe. He lived in Russia almost continuously for 14 years and while there he once sat with Stalin for six and a quarter hours during which he says the Russian dictator did most of the talking. He knows Soviet foreign traveled thousands of miles up and down Russia during his long residence there.

Book of Reference.

Fischer has written the book, "The Soviets in World Affairs," which is a standard reference for students of Russian activities. He is at present writing a book covering the highlights of his experiences in Europe. He covered the civil war in Spain and the outbreak of the second World war.

Fischer has been special European correspondent for The Nation during his last 18 years and has also contributed to the Baltimore Sun and many foreign magazines, including The New Statesman of London and the Prague Tagebuch.
