STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (ACP). A mobile chemistry laboratory, housed in a two-ton truck, has been placed in use by Pennsylvania State college to meet the emergency demands of defense education thruout the state.

The laboratory equipment will travel approximately 10,000 miles by 98 class centers where high school graduates are being trained by the college for technical jobs in defense industries.

Chicago Happy With Football Deemphasized

CHICAGO. (ACP). The University of Chicago is getting along quite well without intercollegiate football, President Robert M. Hutchins reports.

He said that when the sport was abandoned at the end of the 1939 season some persons feared the school's enrollment would suffer and alumni interest would cool. But he added:

"As far as I can see, neither of these fears has been realized. Enrollment has been well maintained. Alumni interest is, I believe, at a higher pitch than at any time since the foundation of the university."

Hutchins said intramural athletics are being promoted and expressed opinion that "the feeling of the university community about the abolition of football is one of relief."
