If Monday's flashy victory over Missouri is indicative of the kind of ball the Huskers are going to play, chances are that Nebraska will be pretty close to the top of the heap when the shooting is all over. However, Iowa State with an impressive non-conference record and one conference victory, and K. U., with Magician Phog Allen at the helm, stand out as pretty serious obstacles along the Big Six road.

Cyclones Drop Missouri.

In a slow-scoring game against the same Missouri team Nebraska rocked 51-45, the Cyclones were victorious by a 34-25 decision, while Kansas tramped on a Tucker-less Oklahoma team to the tune of a 54-32 victory.

Tucker, the center of one of the hottest conference basketball squabbles in many seasons, will be back in action Jan. 30, and with his return fans will have their first chance to see just how serious a bid the Sooners plan to make in this season's conference wars.

Sooners in Fourth Place.

Coach Bruce Drake's cagers, after bowing to the Jayhawks in their opener, moved past K-State's Wildcats 47-40 to land a fourth place in the league race to date.

Kansas State, with five wins and four losses in non-conference competition, slowed down in their first two conference games to drop
