Naval Reserve Opens V1 For College Sophomores

U. S. Naval Reserve has opened a new group called V1 for sophomores in college only. Those who wish to enlist must be between the ages of 17 and 20 and be unmarried.

Enlisted men in V1 will take suggested subjects as part of their regular curriculum during the two years they are to remain in school. These subjects will include physical training, mathematics, and some of the physical sciences.

After completing the two years the men will take examinations and those who successfully pass them and meet certain qualifications will be classified in V7 and will be allowed to continue their college work until they are granted a degree.

The training course will lead to a commission as Ensign in the Naval Reserve. Of the 80,000 sophomores enlisted per year 15,000 will

be taken into V7, 5,000 of whom will go into engineers work.

Of those who do not meet qualifications for V7, part of the group who meet less stiff requirements will be classified in V5 and will be enlisted immediately.

Those who do not qualify for either of the groups will be immediately enlisted in the regular naval service.

The advantages of enlisting in the Naval Reserve V1 will be explained by Ensign N. C. Parks who will be in the Naval Reserve office room 434 of the post office March 20 from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m.

The Naval Reserve is anxious that sophomores who are interested go to the Naval Reserve office. The suggested curriculum will be explained to them there and they can continue with their schooling for two years, knowing they will not be called into the service during that period.
