lecture this morning at 11 a. m. in the Student Union ballroom.
Young, recognized by newspapermen as an expert on the
Far East, had predicted the prolatility of a Japanese-American clash or an "undeclared incident." He served in the orient for
the past 13 years, and is now on an extensive lecture tour. Young is not very well liked by the Japanese who kept him
in prison for two months because he wrote articles "which the police disliked." His release was securred through Ambassador Joseph Grew, a friend of the INS correspoundent.
Since his return, there has been a clamor on the part of
publishers for his articles on Japain. Readers' Dizest. Coronet Esquire, Amerasia and Flying and Popular Aviation have printed articles by him since July, 1941.
