Big Six grid play plumbed the depths of mediocrity this term. Inability of league clubs to cope with any sort of outside competition makes the problem of choosing an all-league team difficult. Every team had certain standouts and those standouts comprise our unofficial club.

Hard-hitting Dub Lamb of Oklahoma and interference-severer, Marv Thompson of Nebraska, are the end choices. For tackle consideration we offer Bernie Pepper, Mizzou's line bulwark, and Vic Schleich, Husker line mainstay. Mizzou's Fitzgerald and Monford, an Oklahoma toughy, head the guard brigade. This "mythical" eleven is presented with two fore-warnings: First, the Big Six season lacks one Saturday of completion. Second, competition was so close for several spots that a veritable coin-flip decided the issue.

Even Missouri Lowers League Grid Prestige

Missouri's Tigers, who need only a conference win over weak Kansas to gallop to the Big Six title reflect the perplexing situation of the Big Six loop with a record of having dropped intersectional tiffs to Wisconsin, Great Lakes, and Fordham while runner-up Nebraska adds further evidence in being slapped down by Iowa, Indiana, Minnesota, Pittsburgh, and Iowa Seahawks during the season. About the only thing the Big Six has salvaged in prestige is Missouri's early season win over New York university.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Fordham's fighting forward wall handcuffed Missouri's highly-touted Bob Steuber and battered to a 20 to 12 intersectional upset victory here Saturday.

Eleven thousand saw the fighting Rams rise up to stymie last period goal line thrusts and hold

Steuber to 34 yards in 13 tries in the first half.

Missouri and Fordham matched touchdowns in the opening of the second period with Ram, Joe Andrejo racing 80 yards down the center for the Fordham score and the Tigers revenging with a Starr to Carter pass they capped a smashing 84 yard drive.

MANHATTEN, Kas.—Rising from the mire of eight straight drubbings, Kansas State's Wildcats stunned Iowa State with crashing forward play to win 7-6 in a major Big Six upset here Saturday.

Propelled by Johnnie Bortka, Earl Williams and Bill Quick the Wildcats blasted 44 yards down field for the first score with Quick passing to Vargon in the end zone and place kick specialist, Williams adding the extra point.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Lowly-rated Temple spured by Freshman "Indian Joe" Neiman gashed highly-favored Oklahoma with defeat, 14 to 7 in a reversal of form here Saturday.

"Indian Joe" threw a 44 yard strike to Kane for Temple's first tally and Woodside intercepted a Huel Hamm toss and went on a 25 yard scoring romp.

Huskers Still Have Chance For Loop Top

News along the Husker injury front following the bruising loss to the Iowa Seahawks was favorable. Outside of scattered bruises, the only real injury was Harold Hungerford's battered skull.

Unless new injuries develop during the week, the Huskers will sally into the season finale with Kansas State Saturday in their best condition since early season. Chances are strong that the five injured performers left at home from the Iowa trip will be available Saturday.

Ends Needed.

Jerry Kathol, Al Zikmund, Henry Reichel, Marv Athey, and Jack Hazen should return from injured ranks to availability. Six seniors will play their last game Saturday. Dale Bradley, Bill Bryant, Jerry Kathol, Al Zikmund, and Marvin Thompson will bow out of competition.

Only hope the Huskers have of winning the title is a Kansas victory over Missouri—providing the Huskers top the Wildcats. If the Jayhawks top the Tigers, Nebraska will swing into the top berth since Missouri has a tie against its record.
