Gymnastic Training at UN Aids Cadet Luke In Rescue

. . . Makes Rescue, 9000 ft. In Air

William E. Luke, 1940 graduate of the university used his knowledge gained in gymnastic training in rescuing an army cameraman dangling in a fouled parachute from a bomber.

Cadet Luke, a former gymnast here at the university and a former member of the varsity wrestling team is a cadet at the Kirk-

land air field, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Dangles from Parachute.

The story of the heroic rescue Sunday of an army cameraman who dangled unconscious from a fouled parachute 9,000 feet in the air was revealed by Lt. H. Finch, public relations officer at the Kirkland air field.

Flying at 9,000 feet the plane hit an air pocket and Private Newell was tossed halfway out of the bomb bay door. His parachute opened and then fouled on the plane threatening to pull him out.

Cadet Luke, seeing that Newell had lost consciousness and was powerless to help himself, swung his legs over a bracing bar, and hanging head down, cut Newell's chute loose and dragged him back to safety.

R. Hoaglund Is New Professor Of Agronomy

Newly appointed professor of agronomy on the campus this semester is Professor Richard Hoaglund, graduate, class of '39.

Since graduation Hoaglund has been a range examiner for the forest service in the state of Utah. He returned this fall to work on his master's degree and accepted the position as professor of agronomy for the second semester.
