On Town Hall Series . . . Franklin P. Adams Entertaining But Lacks Fire of Radio Work

"Just a dreamer with my head in the clouds," is the way Franklin P. Adams characterized himself when he appeared on the Town Hall program Tuesday night. F. P. A., who is a prominent columnist, wit, and an expert on the radio program "Information Please," called his talk "Inside Information Please."

The program was entertaining, but disappointing in the light of previous Town Hall programs. F. P. A. seemed more like a local professor than a celebrated author and wit.

First Radio Experience.

The first time he talked over the radio, he asked the studio technician how he should go about speaking over a microphone. On being told to talk just like he did at home, F. P. A. remarked, "You

mean I can say things like that over the radio?"

When he was asked how he and his fellow experts knew so much, Mr. Adams stated that there are at least fifty men in the country who could do better. "But I'm not telling who because my first duty is to my family," he said.

On one Information Please program, the experts were asked to give Sinclair Lewis' nickname. The red-headed, now slightly bald Mr. Lewis is called "Red" but F. P. A. cracked the answer, "Scarlet No-Hair-a."
