They announced that there will be about 2,000 men in uniform going to classes here by the middle of October. Of this number, the aviation cadets, engineering, foreign area and language students will number about 1,500. The STAR unit on the ag college campus will be kept at around 500.

military units on the campus. These students, sent to the STAR unit here, are from the University of North Dakota, North Dakota college of agriculture, and South Dakota State. They have completed basic training at Camp Wolters, Tex., Camp Roberts, Calif., and Camp Croft, S. C.

To provide quarters for these soldiers, contractors are completing the university athletics field house and the fourth floor of the new library. The field house is expected to quarter about 400 men after the floor and plumbing facilities are completed.

A new floor and ceiling are being put in the fourth floor of the Don L. Love Memorial library. Workmen are installing dining room equipment in parlors XYZ of the Union, which will then be able to take care of meals for 1,500 men.

All equipment will be ready for use soon. Trainees in advanced engineering, foreign area and languages will arrive as soon as facilities are adequate. Classes for the men in ASTP will begin Oct. 11 and will consist of refresher courses.
