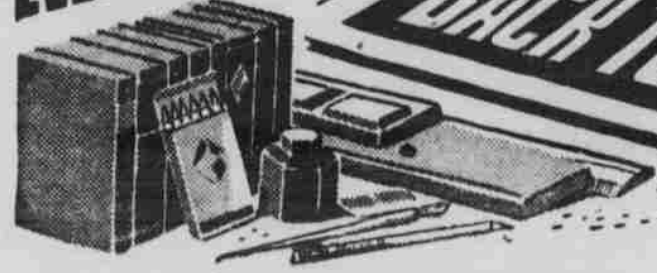
Bus Line Buys Army Bomber With War Bonds
