Hollins Paces Huskers To Break Losing Streak

The Nebraska Cagers took their first game on the home court from a determined, but outclassed South Dakota Five 41 to 31 last night. Lew's boys started to score early in the game and for the greater part of the first half, the two teams battled on even terms. Nebraska led by a slight margin at the half, due largely to the fine all-around play of Ken Hollins. Hollins consistently cashed in on rebounds for many of the Husker's points. In the second half, the Huskers broke away to an early spurge of scoring and built up a substantial lead which they never

lost. The South Dakota boys kept firing away and with the fine work of Schnepf and Girardi they kept themselves very much in the ball-game until the last few minutes when another scoring spurge by the Scarlet and Cream cinched the battle.

Team Improves.

All in all it was an interesting contest to watch inasmuch as both teams were of nearly equal caliber. Naturally, the boys made plenty of mistakes, but they show promise of much improvement in the future. Coach Lewandowski substituted freely throughout the game in an effort to find the best possible combination. The smooth play of Big Ken Hollins, Al Artman, and Gus Eager were bright spots for the Huskers. The boys will have a rest now until after

the holidays when they begin the Big Six race.

Second home game of the year for the Huskers will be the Nebraska-Iowa State fray Saturday evening, January 8. From here it looks like tough sledding for Nebraska. By January 8, Husker Coach Ad Lewandowski will have a few more vacancies in his squad than at the South Dakota game last night, as several team members are slated to drop out within the next couple of weeks.

Iowa State Rates High.

Iowa State is not bothered by lack of adequate material. Coach Lew Menze has three returning lettermen, Ray and Roy Wehde and Gene Oulman, in addition to a healthy crop of navy trainees stationed on the campus. Lyle Naylor from Drake and Robert Sauer from Washington university in St. Louis are two of the more promising of the Naval trainees who are slated for first string positions. Sports writers in the middlewest predict that the Iowa State five is just about tops in the Big Six and the Cyclones were the favorites in their game with Minnesota last night. The Cyclones beat the Iowa Pre-Flight Seahawks 31 to 29 and Minnesota lost to the Seahawks 34 to 54. Minnesota took Nebraska 40 to 21.

Probable starting line-up for the Iowa Staters against the Huskers is as follows: Ray Wehde and Roy Wehde, forwards; Gene Oulman, center; and Robert Sauer, Lloyd Kester, and Lyle Naylor tossing a coin for guard positions.

Preceding the Iowa State-UN game will be a preliminary between the Air Base Raiders and the Nebraska College Training Detachment.
