

Scarlet Prep For Tough ISC Eleven

Cyclones To Be Favorites

Still smarting from the sting of their 27-6 defeat at the hands of the Iowa Hawkeyes last Saturday, the University of Nebraska grid squad settles down this week to prepare for the Iowa State Cyclones, who invade Memorial stadium next Saturday for a conference clash with the Huskers.

Both Nebraska and ISC will be striving to enter the win column again after a losing weekend. Soundly thumped by Iowa, the Scarlet will be seeking to add another conference victory to their Oct. 28 win over Missouri's Tigers. The Cyclones, tabbed in pre-season dope as the team to beat for Big Six honors, were dumped at Ames last Saturday, 12-7, by Oklahoma. Also marring the ISC record is a 21-21 tie with Missouri.

Pre-game guessing installs the Cyclones as decided favorites in Saturday's contest. The Cyclone club packs plenty of experience, with veterans at nearly all posts. Meredith Warner, the conference's leading scorer, and Chuck Wright, UN letter winner in '42 and all-conference guard as a naval-trainee Cyclone last year, lead the Iowa club.

Realizing full well that his charges will once again be playing the all too familiar role of underdogs, Husker coach A. J. Lewandowski was busy Monday and Tuesday polishing rough spots revealed in Saturday's loss to Iowa.

Biggest headache is at right half, with neither starter Chick Knight nor number one replacement Dick Lamberty certain to see action against Iowa State. Knight suffered a rib injury in the first minutes of the Iowa game and Lamberty is still weak from the illness which caused him to be left at home when the team travelled to Iowa City. Doug Nelson, who saw 56 minutes of action against the Hawks, may have to carry the brunt of wing-backing duties again next Saturday, the Lewandowski has shifted quarterback Joe Kessler to the right half spot in an effort to plug the hole.

At left half back Jack Selzer continues to reign as top man, with Ken Hollins and Bill Perdew backing him up. Hollins starred for the Huskers last year but has been hampered by a leg injury for this season. Perdew has shown much promise and lacks only in experience.

Bill Betz still handles quarterback duties and has able support from young Ed Gradoville who completed the pass to Dedrick that started the Huskers on their way to their only score of the day at Iowa City Saturday.

Fullback chores remain in the hands of Junior Collopy, with Joe Kessler and Murl Mauser also groomed for action in the plunging spot.

Line duties are now almost permanently held by Colerick and Koenig at ends, Kops and Lorenz at tackles, Kasdan and Hazard at guards, and Doyle at center. Exceptionally outstanding have been Doyle and Colerick.

Oklahoma Grabs Loop Top As Cyclones Fade

Topping the Iowa State Cyclones, by a 12-7 count last Saturday Oklahoma's 1943 Big Six champions slated themselves for league leaders again this season. The Cyclones had been figured as the top competitor to the Sooners for championship laurels and the Oklahoma victory Saturday leaves no doubt in the minds of fans that the Dewey Luster's boys have the title cinched.

The Sooners still have the Missouri Tigers, Kansas Jayhawks and Nebraska Cornhuskers to face, but none of the three are expected to give the Oklahomans much trouble.

The other four teams in the league played out-of-conference games and netted three wins and one loss.

Kansas University displayed a rejuvenated team that went forth to defeat the Olathe Naval Air Base Clippers by a 33-14 count. Despite the loss of several Navy V-12 athletes the week before, the Jayhawkers still displayed a fast-moving, hard-hitting eleven.

Nebraska accounted for the lone loss, yielding to the Iowa Hawkeyes, 27-6. Tho definitely not showing the spirit and style used against the Missouri Tigers a week before in a rousing upset, the Huskers still made a good stand and towards the end of the contest were pushing the Iowans back.

Missouri came out of a slump and defeated the Michigan State eleven, 13-7. However, Missouri hopes for a good showing against Oklahoma this Saturday were darkened when Bill Dellestatiou suffered a leg injury. Dellestatiou has been the main Tiger offensive threat all year.

K-State Wins.

Kansas State finally tallied a win by bowling over Wichita University, 15-0. The Wildcat squad made a fine showing against the Shockers in notching their first victory.

Missouri and Oklahoma will

provide the top league contest of this week, with the Sooners odds on favorites, especially if Dellestatiou is not able to play with the Missourians.

Nebraska and Iowa State should also stage an interesting game, with the contest being held on the Husker home grounds. If the Huskers click as they did against Missouri, they stand a fine chance of knocking the Cyclones for a loss. If the brand of ball shown against Iowa University is repeated a sure defeat seems in store for the Scarlet.

The other conference contest is the intra-state affair between Kansas and Kansas State. The Aggie team, which started the season from scratch, has improved rapidly the past two weeks and may give the Jayhawkers trouble.
