Tentative plans were announced Monday afternoon for the holding of a "track clinic" for visiting high school coaches and athletes at the university on March 16, during the state high school basketball tournament.

Athletic Director A. J. Lewandowski said the clinic will probably be held in the east stadium, starting at 3 p. m. It will be under the direction of Head Track Coach Ed Weir.

The "clinic" will consist of track events, and moving pictures of former U.N. track meets.

Friday nite at the coliseum, the Lincoln Wings will either regain their role as favorites in the 2nd Air Force tourney or close the book on the current basketball season when they face the 2nd AF Superbombers in the second game of the second game of the quarter-finals.

The pressure will be on the Wings as a result of dropping the opener last week at Colorado Springs. They must take the two remaining games to get into the finals.

Several reasons have been advanced as to why the locals lost the game last week. Either the boys had a siege of staleness or the Superbombers are much better than their record shows. Goose Tatum was held to an all season low while Eddie Ehlers and Vic Krafft were far off shooting form. The Superbombers 46 points represents their average score for the entire year, while the Wings' total of 44 was 17 tallies lower than their average.

Is the 2nd AF defense really good enough to hold the Wings that low or were the boys really "off the beam?"

Last Saturday nite's win over the Kansas Jayhawkers was the Cornhuskers' seventh win over the Mount Oread five in 14 years of Big Six play. The defeat

knocked Phog Allen's boys out of the first place deadlock with Oklahoma, the Sooners taking over first place by whipping the Kansas Aggies.

Nebraska's Art Peterson still leads the Big Six scoring parade with a total of 93 points, but Iowa States' Jim Myers leads Art by slightly over one point in the points per game average.

UN Trackmen Lose, 54-29

Big Bill Rangert of Missouri set a new meet record of 51 feet 9 1/4 inches in the shotput as the powerful Mizou Tigers defeated the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers 54-29 in a dual meet in the Tiger lair last Saturday night. The Tigers scored in all of the 12 events and won 8 of them.

Harry Exler, winning the high jump and the broad jump, scored doubles for Missouri, and Nebraskas' Norval Barker won both the high and low hurdles. Dean Kratz, Cornhusker middle distance champ won the 440-yard dash, but fell in the half mile run, and recovered only in time to place second.

Dick Miller, Nebraska's high jumper and pole vaulter, won the vault with a mark of 12 feet, and placed second in the high jump.

Herbie Morrison, former Lincoln high man, placed second in the mile run.
