J. Thompson. The letter stated that Long's eating place was the only one not acceptable under sanitation regulations.

**Campus Police Force.** A report was also submitted at the meeting to the effect that it is impossible under present conditions to obtain more campus policemen. In order to get additional street lights, a petition must be circulated, according to Roberta Collins, council member. It was also emphasized that students if molested, are to call the Lincoln city police force and not Dean Boyles.

Upon the suggestion of council member Mary Jo Gish, a committee has been selected to determine campus feeling in regard to a dandelion clean-up campaign

in the organized houses. The suggestion was made because of the inability to hire men to do the work.
