Slowly returning to normal activities, Ivy Day this year will bring back to the campus some of the traditions which have been omitted during wartime in the past few years.

At 1 p. m. tomorrow in the coliseum the pageant and ceremony which accompanies the crowning of the May Queen, the planting of the ivy and masking of new Mortar Boards will begin.

In 1901 the building of customs to be followed in future years was started on the annual senior class day. The class poet and orator were introduced on that day.

Tapping of the 13 Innocents became a part of Ivy Day in May, 1903. The organization was founded as a purely Cornhusker group, having no affiliation with a national society, to foster student spirit.
