He is a native Nebraskan and graduated from the university in 1897 with an AB degree. He obtained an MA in 1898. Mr. Johnson received an honorary degree from the university at the 1940 commencement exercises.

The convo speaker was a professor of economics at Nebraska from 1906 to 1908. He has taught at the University of Texas, University of Chicago, Leland Stanford university and at Cornell. Mr. Johnson was editor of the New Republic from 1917 to 1923 and became director of the New School of Social Research in 1923.
