be detrimental to the general interests of the university.

The platform, as submitted to

the Student Council, is as follows:

"Holding to the tenet that all parts of the university system exist to promote the development of its students, we have set forth the following principles as nec-

essary for the establishment and maintenance of an effectual student society.

"I. All student governmental functions must be performed honestly and efficiently to provide the student body with a strong voice in expressing its desires.

All Students.

"To this end, participation in elections and other such programs must be extended to the entire student body.

"II. A simplified and clear cut system of student activities must be evolved which will meet the needs of all individuals within the university. This must include provisions to meet the social and professional needs of the many diverse groups now on the campus.

"III. To carry out such a program all student offices must be filled by experienced candidates who will remain open to all lines of campus thought."

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
