

Three NCAA Kings To Run In KU Relays

LAWRENCE, Kas., April 19.—Champions galore will vie for honors in the 21 annual Kansas Relays here tomorrow. Three national collegiate champions and a National A.A.U. champion head the field.

Only two-time N.C.A.A. cross country champion in track history is Fred Feiler of Drake. The wiry little Bulldog ace will anchor Drake's teams in the two mile and distance medley relays.

Up against Feiler in the distance medley relay will be Bobby Ginn of Nebraska, who captured the N.C.A.A. mile crown with a time of 4:11.1 in 1941 before the war interrupted his college career.

Texas' brilliant crop of fleet sprinters will be headed by Earl Collins, team captain and N.C.A.A. 220 yard dash champion last year. Aiding and abetting Collins will be two Texas Relays 100 yard dash champions, Allen Lawler, this year's winner, and Andy Shurr, who captured the century in 1945.

Missouri standouts in the individual events will be L. D. Howe, crack high jumper, and Bob Crowson, sprint ace. Howe tied for first in the high jump at the National A.A.U. meet last summer with a leap of 6 feet, 5 3/4 inches. Crowson ran second to Collins in the 1945 N.C.A.A. 220 yard dash and finished third in the 100.

Brightest Star.

Brightest star in the whole Kansas Relays field may well be Harrison Dillard, hurling sensation from Baldwin-Wallace college of Ohio. A brilliant hurdler before going into the army, the Negro boy has come back better than ever.

Prior to his spending 34 months in the army, a good deal of which was in the Italian campaign, Dillard had been Penn Relays champion in the 1943 high hurdles and had chalked up a 22.8 for the 220 yard low hurdles, one of the five turned in in this event.

Back from the army only in time for the tag end of the indoor season, Dillard ran wild in those meets. At the Knights of Columbus meet in Cleveland, the Baldwin-Wallace star defeated Ed Dugger, National A.A.U. indoor champion in the high hurdles, and Buddy Young, ex-Illinois streak, in the low hurdles.

The following night at the Purdue Relays, Dillard set a new American record in the 60 yard low hurdles. In both the high and low hurdles that night he vanquished George Walker of Illinois, 1945 NCAA champion.

In the javelin throw the field includes Herb Grote of Nebraska, runnerup at the 1940 NCAA meet; Paul Fagerlind of Iowa, second at the NCAA session; Leonard Naab of Michigan State, 1942 Central Intercollegiate champion; and Karl Ebel of Kansas from Look's "All-Interscholastic Track Team."

Other place winners from the 1945 NCAA meet set to perform in the Kansas Relays are Dick Miller of Nebraska, third in the pole vault; and Dean Kratz of Nebraska, fourth in the mile run.

Champions from the first big outdoor meet of the season, the Texas Relays, will compete at Kansas in seven events. In addition to Lawler in the 100 yard dash, there will be Tom Scofield of Kansas, high jump; Miller of Nebraska, pole vault; Drake, distance medley relay; Kansas State, two mile relay; Texas, half-mile relay; and Abilene Christian, college mile relay.

Scofield faces a bevy of champions in the high jump. Along with the National AAU co-champion, Howe, will be Dwayne Feekin of Iowa State, Big Six indoor champion, and Bob Stoland of the Jayhawkers, Kansas Relays co-champion in 1941 and Big Six indoor champion the same year. Feekin set a new record of 6 feet 4 inches at the conference indoor meet.

Big Six indoor champions of 1946 in action at the Relays will include Laddie Harp of Oklahoma, winner of the 60 yard dash; Bill Arlen of Iowa State, mile run; John Canaris of Oklahoma, two mile run; Jon Sharp of Oklahoma, high and low hurdles; Feekin, high jump; Pedersen of Iowa State, broad jump; Miller, pole vault; and Ned Nutzman of Nebraska, shot put. Iowa State's 440 and 880 conference champions, Rowland and Jones, were transferred by the navy just after the indoor meet.

Colorado brings a team of pre-war quality to the Relays with mainstays in Loren Creese, holder of the Big Seven conference shot put record; Harold McAfferty, former Gothenberg high school ace, co-champion in the 1942 conference high jump; Tom Pitchford, conference pole vault winner in 1942; Bob Chipman, Rocky Mountain AAP mile champ that same year; and Don Campbell, National AAU junior 200 meter title winner in 1944.

Sandstedt to Pitch.

Jim Sandstedt, ace of the Nebraska mound staff, will get the call for the Friday's tilt. The former Omaha sandlot star was in complete command all the way in his first appearance of the season against Colorado, but was not used in a starting role during the Minnesota series.

Harold "Tap" Jacob is expected to be the Husker pitcher in Saturday's game, which will begin at 2:00. Friday's tilt will get under way at 4:00 and in case of rain a double header will be played Saturday.

The visiting Oklahoma nine split a two-game series with Iowa State last weekend, but prior to that had been undefeated in a swing through Texas.

Mitchell Heads Sooners.

Outfielder Dale Mitchell is the big gun in the Oklahoma hitting attack. In his first year in college ball he led the Sooners in batting with a mark of .420. He spent some time in the service but is now back in a baseball uniform hitting in the cleanup spot for Coach Jack Baer's team.

The Nebraska lineup will have Dean Jackson at first base, Bobby Rubino at second, Wes Maser at shortstop and Wilbur Baach at third. Bill Kinnamon will be behind the plate, with Frank Brown, Bob Bolen and Truck Williams in the outfield.

With a record of one win and one loss, the University of Nebraska tennis team will face the University of Oklahoma tennis team this weekend in two matches.

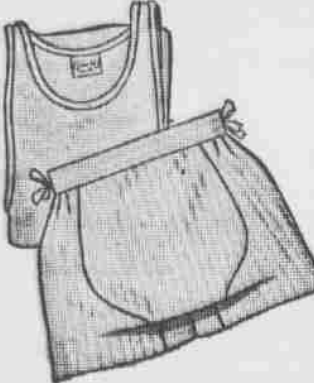
