Examination Schedule

Laboratory classes meeting for several continuous hours on one or two days shall meet for examinations as follows: Classes meeting on Monday and Tuesday shall be examined on the date scheduled for the first hour of their laboratory meeting; Wednesday or Thursday classes on the second hour of their meeting; Friday or Saturday classes on the third hour. Unit examinations have been scheduled for all sections in the following subjects: (1) Business Organization 3 and 4; (2) Civil Engineering 1; (3) Economic 11 and 12; (4) Education 61 and 62; (5) English A, 1, 2, 3, 4, 11, 12, 28; (6) French 11, 12, 14; (7) Home Economics 41 and 42; (8) Mathematics 11, 12, 13, 21, 22, 42, 101, 102, 103, 104; (9) Mechanical Engineering 1; (10) Psychology 70; (11) Spanish 52 and 54. If students have regularly scheduled examinations conflicting with the above specially arranged schedule, arrangements to take such specially scheduled examinations at another time should be made with the department concerned on or before May 13. For example: If a student is scheduled for an examination which conflicts with a specially scheduled examination in French, arrangements should be made with the French department to take such French examination at another time.
