

Examination Schedule

Laboratory classes meeting for several continuous hours on one or two days shall meet for examinations as follows: Classes meeting on Monday and Tuesday shall be examined on the date scheduled for the first hour of their laboratory meeting; Wednesday or Thursday classes on the second hour of their meeting; Friday or Saturday classes on the third hour. lastically of their high school class to be admitted to the university.

(4) Limited enrollment of first year students next fall in the college of engineering to 500. The engineering college is now operating at maximum capacity in freshman and sophomore classes because of heavy enrollment in engineering courses by veterans, it was explained.

Limited Enrollment.

(5) Limited enrollment of stu-

dents seeking music degrees in the School of Music to 65 next fall; and limited enrollment of graduate students seeking advanced degrees in music in the School of Music to 30, effective next fall. A School of Music report said it did not have sufficient faculty, equipment or class space to accommodate all students desiring a major in music without denying music instruction to other students in the university not seeking music degrees.

In addition, the budget for the next fiscal year included \$136,948

from operating reserve funds to provide for an anticipated deficit at Nebraska.

Limitation on non-resident enrollment was recommended to the board to reduce the number of students, not admitted to crowded

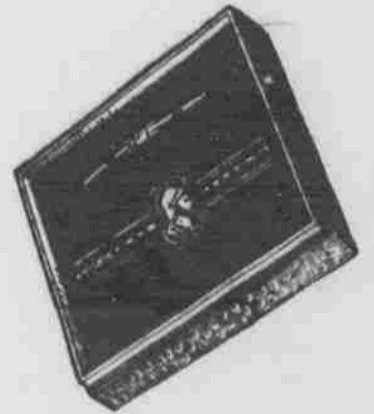

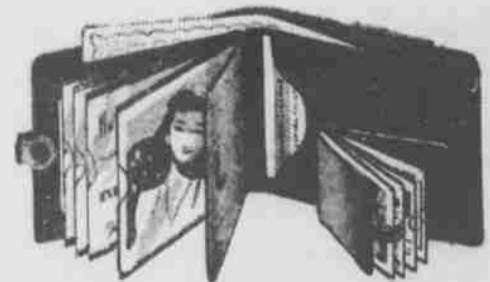
