Ireland Urges Dental Reform At Convention

"The excuses which dentists have made for not treating children would be ludicrous if they were not so lamentable," Dr. Ralph Ireland, professor of pedodontics in dentistry college, declared in an address given at the Nebraska State Dental association convention in Omaha Monday.

Urging Nebraska dentists to assume more responsibility and interest in the care of children's teeth, Dr. Ireland continued. "One dentist informed a mother seeking treatment for her child that 'it is against the law to operate on baby teeth.' Another refused to fill cavities in the teeth of a five year old boy because he 'could not stand to see the little boy suffer.'"

No Excuse.

Dr. Ireland called these, and

other excuses given, selfish, and said they are usually indefensible. He added that lack of understanding of the special operative procedures needed in caring for primary or "baby" teeth was partly to blame.

In an effort to reform dental practices, Dr. Ireland suggested that the first dental examination be made when a child is two and one-half to three years old; that before operative treatment is attempted dentist know the differences between primary and permanent teeth; and that the operative procedures used on adults are not suitable for children.

Examination Schedule

If students have regularly scheduled examinations conflicting with the above specially arranged schedule, arrangements to take such specially scheduled examinations at another time should be made with the department concerned on or before May 13. For example: If a student is scheduled for an examination which conflicts with a specially scheduled examination in French, arrangements should be made with the French department to take such French examination at another time.

Bengston To Write Associate Degree Research Bulletin

Dean Nels A. Bengston of the junior division has been appointed by the U. S. office of education to write a research bulletin on college and university two-year courses leading to associate degrees.

A pioneer in the associate degree field, the university began offering two-year courses in 1942. They are composed of 40 percent vocational work and 60 percent cultural subjects, designed for students who cannot afford or lack the time for a full four year university course.

The bulletin is being prepared for the purpose of interesting more colleges and universities in including two years courses in their curriculums. Dean Bengston will collaborate with six other educators in writing the bulletin.
