Nebraska university has been named fourth highest in the nation in terms of over-all educational program in a recent study by two Iowa State college educa-

Nebraska is topped only by Utah, Kansas and Oregon, with Iowa State ranked fifth,

Ratings Determined.

The study, made by Raymond M. Hughes, president emeritus, and William H. Lancelot, professor of vocational education, placed nine out of the nation's ten best educational systems in states west of the Mississippi river. "Neither the older nor the wealthier states seem any longer to be at or near the head of the educational pro-cession in America," stated the authors.
