## Federalists, Unitarians Hold Joint Meeting

At a recent joint meeting of the American Unitarian Youth and the Student Federalists, a discussion devoted to phases of federal world government was held.

During the discussion problems facing the creation of such a government were discussed at length, with the Student Federalists explaining their stands on the various issues.

It was pointed out by the Federalists that the most advisable plan was to call a world convention, under the stipulations of Article 109 of the United Nations charter, and by so doing get delegates from all the nations of the world together for the purpose of establishing a world government that would meet the individual needs of each nation.

A motion was made from the floor for the Unitarians to support a world government that would be brought about under the provisions of the United Nations charter, and was passed unanimously.

## Examination Schedule

Laboratory classes meeting for several continuous hours on one or two days shall meet for examinations as follows: Classes meeting on Monday and Tuesday shall be examined on the date scheduled for the first hour of their laboratory meeting; Wednesday or Thursday classes on the second hour of their meeting; Friday or Saturday classes on the third hour. Unit examinations have been scheduled for all sections in the following subjects: (1) Business Organization 3, 4, 21; (2) Chemistry 1 and 3; (3) Civil Engineering 1; (4) Economics 11 and 12; (5) Education 30, 61, 62; (6) Electrical Engineering 135 and 237; (7) English A, 1, 2, 3, 4, 11; (8) French 11 and 13; (9) Geography 71; (10) Home Economics 41 and 42; (11) Mathematics 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 22, 41, 42, 101, 102, 104; (12) Mechanical Engineering 1; (13) Psychology 70; (14) Spanish 51 and 53. If students have regularly scheduled examinations conflicting with the above specially arranged schedule, arrangements to take such specially scheduled examinations should be made with the department concerned on or before January 16. For example: If a student is scheduled for an examination which conflicts with a specifically scheduled examination in French, arrangements should be made with the French department to take such French examination at another time.
